Racemes terminal, often paired Flowers with hirsute calyx, white corolla Nutlet grayish-brown, rugose, prominently keeled Illustrated by Frank A. Lang From: Threatened and Endangered Vascular Plants of Oregon (1982) R. J. Meinke

Annual, erect herb. Stems stout, usually glabrous below, hispid above, 15-70 dm high. Leaves linear; lower leaves opposite, glabrous or sparsely ciliate, 2-8 cm long; upper leaves alternate, pubescent, 0.5-4 cm long. Inflorescence a raceme, coiled in bud, terminal, often in pairs; pedicels 1-2 mm long. Flower: calyx hirsute, 4-6 mm long in fruit; corolla white, 4-10 mm broad. Fruit a nutlet, ovate, approximately 2 mm long, grayish brown, rugose, prominently keeled.


